

By the Numbers...

- 11% of households have no internet connection
- 26% do not have a broadband connection
- 40% of households below the poverty line do not have broadband

Digital divide is the issue. Digital equity is the goal. Digital inclusion is the work.





Digital Equity = The Goal

"Digital equity is a condition in which all individuals and communities have the information technology capacity needed for **full participation in our society, democracy, and economy**. Digital equity is necessary for civic and cultural participation, employment, lifelong learning, and access to essential services."

Digital Inclusion = The Work

- 1. Affordable, robust broadband internet service;
- Internet-enabled devices that meet the needs of the user;
- 3. Access to digital literacy training;
- 4. Quality technical support; and
- Applications and online content designed to enable and encourage self-sufficiency, participation and collaboration.

MHLS has focused on:

1. Broadband as library infrastructure

- Toward Gigabit Libraries Toolkit Training & On Demand Consultations
- Participation in **Connect NY Libraries: A Broadband Improvement Pilot** (Phases 1 & 2)
- Increasing the number of member libraries who are accessing the federal **E-Rate** program
- 2. Increasing public access to broadband connections at member libraries
 - Beyond the Library Wi-Fi Project (installing wide area network routers at 44 member libraries)

3. Enhancing Digital Literacy Services

Connection Speeds



Since its inception in 1997, the E-rate program has helped ensure that eligible schools and libraries have affordable access to the Internet. **Discounts range from 20 to 90 percent** and are based on the poverty level of the schools. Rural schools and libraries may also receive a higher discount.

The Federal Communications Commission (FCC) adopted the *E-rate Modernization Order* on July 11, 2014


The Order adopts as a bandwidth target the American Library Association's recommendation that **all libraries that serve fewer than 50,000 people have broadband speeds of at least** <u>100 Mbps</u> **and all libraries that serve 50,000 people or more have broadband speeds of at least** <u>1 Gbps</u>. 52% of MHLS member libraries currently report they do not have the connectivity **speed recommended** by the **Federal Communications** Commission (FCC) and the American Library Association

Recommended: a minimum of **100 Mbps for serving** smaller communities and **1 Gbps for libraries serving** populations greater than 50,000 people

Opportunities:

- "Incorporate tailored digital literacy trainings into public computing center programming such as libraries' existing Digital Navigator
 programs to address the specific needs of populations like aging individuals, individuals with disabilities, individuals with language barriers, formerly incarcerated individuals, and veterans."
- "Invest in physical and digital accessibility across New York's public library system. As highlighted throughout this plan, libraries are a key partner in the fight to close the digital divide, so their buildings and websites need to be accessible to all covered populations for CAO to effectively partner with them in identifying and scaling programs as part of the Capacity Grant Program."

FCC adopts rules to eliminate 'digital discrimination' for communities with poor internet access

- "Poorer, less white neighborhoods were found to have received lower investment in broadband infrastructure and offered worse deals for internet service than comparatively whiter and higher-income areas."*
- Allows the FCC to review and investigate instances of discrimination by broadband providers to different communities based on income, race, ethnicity and other protected classes.
